

Ukraine Hate Crime Report 2019

Summary

Ukraine regularly submits data on hate crimes to ODIHR. In 2019, the National Police of Ukraine and the Ministry of Internal Affairs worked with ODIHR to publish an information booklet on Categorizing and Investigating Hate Crimes in Ukraine: A Practical Guide. Ukraine's National Human Rights Strategy includes an objective to "create a system for preventing, combating, documenting and investigating hate crimes". In 2020, a working group co-ordinated by the Human Rights Commissioner of the Ukrainian Parliament was created to improve hate crime recording procedures.

ODIHR's Key Observation

ODIHR observes that Ukraine has not reported on cases of hate crimes separately from cases of hate speech or discrimination.



Official Data

Reported figures include cases of violation of equality (Article 161 of the Criminal Code), which may have included violence.




National Developments

ODIHR's publication *Categorizing and Investigating Hate Crimes in Ukraine: A Practical Guide* was published in May 2019. The Guide aims to assist prosecutors overseeing the investigation process, and complements the efforts of the **National Police**Main Investigation Department and the Human Rights Department, which launched a detailed Methodological Recommendation on Investigating Hate Crimes in 2017.




Incidents reported by civil society



Nash Svit and Kantor Center reported descriptive incidents as well as statistical data. This explains the discrepancy between the graphic above and the incidents included below.




Targeted properties
